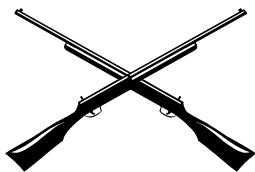


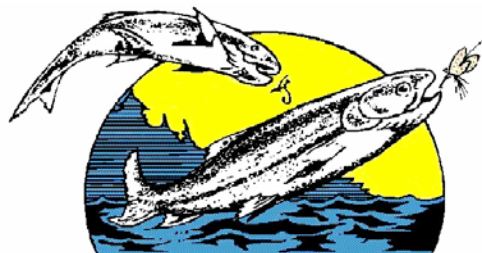

New Adaptive Shooting Equipment

CTO has added a new piece of adaptive shooting equipment to our loan closet. It's aptly named the Zero Gravity Shooting Device. A gentleman from Minnesota who brought it to Broken Wing's pheasant hunt in 2005 created it. Pat Nieuwenhuis brought the plans home with him and Judy Paluch had photos of it sent to Mark Baehr so we could make our own version here. Pat got Fox Valley Tool & Die to donate part of the labor to build it and William Baehr completed it.

The zero gravity shooting device was built for those who have little arm strength and find it difficult or impossible to grasp and shoulder a gun, such as; those suffering from paralysis, MS, amputees, and many others. How does it work you say? It's a very simple but effective concept. The Zero Gravity device is basically a fulcrum very similar to an old fashioned scale. Weights are added to one end of the fulcrum (arm) until it equals/balances the weight of users gun thus allowing the gun user to shoulder the gun without having to support the weight of the gun. It is mounted on a rod with a free-floating bearing allowing the user to swing left & right and up & down as well. It should allow many more people to enjoy both hunting and shooting. While it is useable now we are planning to make a few more adjustments that should improve its overall functioning.

3rd Annual Spring Wild Turkey Hunt

Apply by November 24, 2007

This coming spring will mark our 3rd year of co-sponsoring a Spring Wild Turkey Hunt with the Autumn Long Beards, a NWTF Chapter, from Clintonville, WI. Right now the main things our physically challenged members and friends who would like to hunt with us this coming spring need to know is they must apply for a spring harvest tag for **Wild Turkey Management Zone 22 for the 5th week of the spring hunt by December 1st, 2008.** There is a \$3 fee for applying unless you have a Patrons license.

Rory Clark, the Autumn Long Beards disabled hunt coordinator, expects to have enough volunteers to accommodate at least 10 hunters. If more hunters apply than we have room for a preference system will be used to give 1st time hunters 1st preference, hunters who've not harvested a bird receiving 2nd, and hunters who've harvested a bird 3rd. We hope everyone understands the need to implement a preference system.

We don't want to discourage anyone from applying for a harvest tag but it could be very possible for you to receive a tag and not be chosen to attend the hunt due to your lower preference status. **To prevent this from happening we are requesting all physically challenged people who want to hunt with us this spring contact Mark Baehr by November 24th, 2007 to apply.** Mark will record your information and contact you back after the 24th to tell if you received preference to participate in the hunt. We haven't had to turn people away in the past but due to our continued growth we may have to this year or in coming years. Unfortunately, that's the reality.

We are also reserving overnight lodging again this year in the Clintonville area where we'll have our headquarters and a place to serve meals. There is absolutely no fee charged to any participant. We are just beginning to put the hunt plans together and much more information on our progress and plans will be coming in the next several months.

MINNESOTA BROKEN WING DISABILITY PHEASANT HUNT

On September 7, Wayne, my husband and helper, and I set out to Pine River in Minnesota for a once-in-a-life-time pheasant hunt. We hunted on Saturday the 8th and Sunday the 9th, that encompassed three fields with three pheasants sent up on each field.

All our expenses for food, hotel, all shells, a beautiful plaque, a goody bag, any equipment needed and transportation to and from the hunting area were completely paid for by Minnesota Broken Wing.

On Friday we had a (get-to-know each other) fish fry and, we were given information and showed a slide show explaining what we could do in the next two days. Besides the nine birds that would be put up for our shooting, we could utilize as much trap shooting that we wanted, cross bow shooting at 3-D targets in a pre-set area in the woods, pellet gun shooting and there was lots of food and soft drinks available at all times during both days.

The dogs were wonderful to watch as they ran back and forth hunting for the scent of the pheasants. When they went "on point", we knew where the bird was; and now we got set for the bird. You just cannot explain the feeling when they pull the dogs away from the shooting area, you are pointing your gun where the bird is, the silence just before the bird takes off and your shot hits its target. What an experience.

Unfortunately, Saturday was a rain filled day. During the rain, some of the pheasants were a little difficult and ran instead of flying which made shooting more of a challenge. Sunday we all finished shooting the last field and any extra pheasants that got away the day before and our dog would find for us. All our birds were cleaned, frozen, marked with your name, and made ready for your trip back.

Our banquet and awards were on Saturday night. We had a delicious steak dinner, silent and live auction, awards were given out, we received a beautiful plaque (with a place for our picture that would be sent home later), and a bunch of hunting goodies.

We were lucky that two other members of Challenge the Outdoors were also chosen for the pheasant hunt. Steve Lang and Bill Ploor arrived a little later than us, but we got together whenever we could. The members of Minnesota Broken Wing kept us very busy, and we never lacked for something to do.

Field Grants Program Guidelines Challenge the Outdoors, Inc

At the September, 2007 BOD meeting, revisions were discussed and approved for the CTO Field Grant Program. The program is designed to aid physically challenged members of Challenge the Outdoors, Inc to experience once-in-a-lifetime outdoor recreational events that they can not otherwise afford to attend. To be eligible to apply and receive funding under the Field Grant Program, an individual must be a disabled member of Challenge the Outdoors, Inc for at least one calendar year.

These grants (a maximum of \$200.00) are not available to non-disabled members of CTO.

A Field Grant will not be awarded to an individual for participation in another organization's event if CTO already conducts a similar event. The Field Grant Committee and Board of Directors can consider an exception under special circumstances. Persons that have received funds under the CTO Field Grant Program are not be eligible for another Field Grant to participate in the same type of event in the future. For example: A disabled member of Challenge the Outdoors is awarded a Field Grant to hunt Pronghorn in Wyoming. This member may not apply for another Field Grant to hunt pronghorn in the future. CELEBRATION ABILITIES

In 2001 L.I.F.E. study in the Fox Cities identified a need for a better understanding of disabled friends and neighbors. The Abilities Awards recognize those who help make a difference in the community. There are three categories, Organization, Individual, and Community at large.

I wrote the required 100 word nomination article about Challenge the Outdoors, Inc. In the article I explained our mission statement and the assistance we give to disabled persons to help them enjoy fishing, hunting, and the outdoors again. I explained about our grants that assist with the development of fishing areas for disabled persons.

I was notified in September that we had won. On Monday, October 8th, Wayne and I went to the banquet to receive the award. Upon receiving the award I thanked the committee and gave a small explanation of Challenge the Outdoors' mission.

The person who won the individual award is our own Associate Director, Rene Grode. He is greatly involved in disability advocacy and accessibility. He also mentioned his enjoyable involvement in Challenge the Outdoors and our opportunities to get the disabled persons into outdoor events.

We will display this award with our other awards at booth presentations and at our Annual Banquet.

[Cost Sharing Program for Adaptive Equipment Catching on](#)

We know adaptive equipment can be a bit pricey so our hope, by creating this cost sharing program in December of 2004, was to help our physically challenged members offset that cost and encourage them to purchase their own equipment. Thus creating more independence for them. So far CTO has helped several members purchase adaptive hunting equipment including crossbows and hand cranks, and an adapted gunstock. We are still waiting for the 1st adaptive fishing equipment request. For those unfamiliar with our cost sharing program here's how it works. **CTO will help our physically challenged members purchase adaptive hunting or fishing equipment by picking up to ½, but not to exceed \$100.00, for the cost of the piece(s) of equipment 1 time per year.** For example say Jane purchases a crank for her crossbow and it cost \$150.00. CTO would reimburse Jane \$75.00. To receive reimbursement for a piece of adaptive equipment you have purchased or to see if a piece of equipment you're considering purchasing qualifies contact Jean or Harland Chapman. ***Note, keep your receipt and get a duplicate copy of the original because we will need a copy for our records. And if you return the item please reimburse CTO.** If you are looking for sources of adaptive equipment there are hundreds to choose from so shop around and check our website out for links to sellers and suppliers and as always please show patronage to the many businesses that have been so good to us over the years by giving them your and our business. For a list of these businesses contact Larry Zander. **Thank you.**

CTO LOAN CLOSET IS ALWAYS OPEN!!

We currently have the following pieces of gear available: 20 camouflaged hunting blinds, 4 crossbows (with case, quiver, arrows, and broad heads), 4 Archery target bags, 2 electric fishing rod & reel combos, several small tackle boxes with terminal fishing tackle (hooks, jigs, sinkers & bobbers), 3 shooting chairs, several gun/bow rests, 4 Ice fishing shelters (Donated by The Wingettes of the WOW), an adaptive bowling ball, and a complete set of adaptive golf clubs (Donated by CTO member Pete Jensma), Sit Ski (Donated by Joe Palmer of Manitowoc). If you have a suggestion on a piece of equipment that you think our members would find useful please forward the idea to one of the directors for action.

Most if not all of us have borrowed something from someone at one time or another. The one thing the borrower usually asks is “please return it in the same shape you found it in and if it is broken or damaged due to an accident please let me know so I can fix it.” That is exactly what CTO is asking of anyone who borrows a piece of equipment from our loan closet. If you do borrow something please treat it as if it is your own and take good care of it. If you do not take care of the equipment you borrowed and return it is disrepair or broken your borrowing privileges may be revoked. Our loan closet has been a great resource for our members and we owe it to ourselves to keep it that way. Your cooperation is greatly appreciated. Thank You!

MEMBERSHIP TO THE NICOLET RIFLE CLUB

Are you interest in shooting on a fairly regular basis or entering a rifle competition? We obtained four, one-year memberships to the Nicolet Rifle Club in Suamico. These memberships are worth \$50 each and are available to all our members at no charge, on a first ask basis. If the memberships are already issued to other members, we will put your name on a list for our next four, one-year memberships in 2008. These will be given in the order of the receipt of request.

You will have access to the rifle range at anytime except when there is a competition in progress. You will be responsible to make sure the gate is locked at all times unless there is some competition or special sight in for groups for which they are in charge of locking the gate.

After a special walk through and complete orientation and explanation of the safety rules of the club, you will receive a membership card and the combination to the gate.

This membership is not for a person that just wants to sight in their rifle; this is for a person who likes to shoot for enjoyment and for more than one session. There are many competitions you can join, or you can just find time to shoot your gun for your own entertainment.

The Nicolet Rifle Club is located in Suamico, just a short distance outside the city of Green Bay. The club has many shooting stations and the distance for shooting is 25, 50, 75, 100, and 200 yards. This is club is just for **rifle and pistol**, except if you have called the persons that are in charge and asked them to set up a special target so you can see how your shotgun is patterning for bird shooting. This isn't one of their regular set ups on the range. There is **no** archery shooting and **no** aerial shooting. (skeet or trap)

August

- Joe Henry, a DNR Ecologist out of the Green Bay office, gave a little speech. One of his responsibilities is to implement the Wild Life Action Plan, which identifies key species that are not on the endangered list.
- Agreed to pay \$350 for land rental for the goose hunt.
